

Purpose and benefits of the GHS

- Enhance the protection of human health and the environment by providing an internationally comprehensible system for hazard communication;
- Provide a legal framework for countries without an existing system;
- Reduce the need for testing and evaluation of chemicals;
- Facilitate international trade in chemicals whose hazard have been properly assessed and identified on an international basis



Implementation - focus areas

- Inclusion in legislation
- Institutional capacity building
- Enforcement
- Financing (E.g. registers, enforcement, helpdesk)
- Guiding industry, public awareness





Our experiences from cooperation for GHS implementation outside EU



- It is essential that legislation comes first.
- Implementation in legislation has to be followed by enforcement to make the GHS work.
- The fact that different departments/ministries are responsible can lead to challenges in implementation.



Experiences from GHS implementation in EU

- Benefits of regional cooperation (drafting legislation, harmonising enforcement, helpdesk questions etc.)
- Transitional periods
- New versions of the GHS purple book (changes through EU delegated regulations)
- Mandatory helpdesk in all EU countries
- Industry benefits through union legislation
